#### RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Panel:-

- (1) consider and comment on the response from North Somerset Clinical Commissioning Group (NSCCG) and Weston Area Health NHS Trust (WAHT) to its recommendations in respect of support services for homeless patients being discharged from hospital.
- (2) request that the NSCCG and WAHT attend the next meeting of the Panel to report any progress on the implementation of the recommendations.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF REPORT

The Adult Social Services and Housing Policy and Scrutiny Panel (ASSH) established a working group to investigate concerns about the provision of support services for homeless patients when being discharged for hospital and to consider opportunities for improvements.

The working group reported on its findings in February 2016 (see appendix 1) and Members are asked to consider the responses from the NSCCG and WAHT to this report (see appendix 2) and to comment as appropriate.

#### 2. **POLICY**

Policy and scrutiny contributes towards the council's corporate aim: Improving the way we work. Most reviews undertaken by this Panel contribute towards the Council's aim of enhancing well-being.

## 3. **DETAILS**

Following the publication in July 2014 of a Healthwatch North Somerset report highlighting concerns about the provision of support services for homeless patients at discharge from hospital, the ASH Panel established a working group to investigate these concerns and to consider opportunities for improvements.

The Panel working group agreed the following objectives:-

- to build on the findings of the Healthwatch report by further investigating the effectiveness of processes and services connected with the discharge of homeless people from hospital; and
- to explore opportunities to improve services.

Meetings were arranged with outreach workers and other support service providers, referral agencies and with commissioners and the Weston Area Health NHS Trust.

The specific aims of these meetings were: -

a), to further investigate and isolate the *key challenges and gaps* in service provision by talking to support workers (those with direct experience of providing housing and follow-up health care to homeless and vulnerably housed patients); and

b) to identify *potential improvements* in a subsequent focussed discussion with the hospital and commissioners about these identified challenges and gaps.

The findings and recommendations of the working group were set out in its report (see appendix 1) and were subsequently endorsed by the Panel at its informal meeting on 18th March 2016. NSCCG and WAHT's response to this report is at appendix 2.
